Did you know?

Did you know that the Jean Cargill Post 129 was started as a nurse's post at the Newington VA? And did you know that Jean Cargill was an Army Nurse during World War I who served overseas and in the states? Did you know that at the time of her death, she was a Legionnaire, the 1st Vice-Commander for the Farmington Post, James Palache Post 53 and 1st District Child Welfare Chairman? She was the 1st Vice-Commander, Government Hospital & Membership Chairman from 1927-30.

On the Newington VA Hospital grounds there are trees which were all dedicated to each nurse/legionnaire when each died and the area to and from the walk... the trees were once referred to as the "World War Memorial Nurses Walk and Grove." The dedication was started in 1933. One of the trees was dedicated to the post's namesake: Jean Cargill.

DID YOU KNOW THAT THERE IS AN AMERICAN LEGION STATE FOREST IN CONNECTICUT?

Did you know that the Connecticut American Legion starting in the 1920s went out and bought acres of forest in Barkhamsted? By 1930, there were over 500 acres and today, there are over 1000 acres located on the Western side of the Farmington River. In July, 1927, The American Legion donated some 300 acres to the state. As you can see, the forest has grown and is known as The American Legion Forest. It is primarily used for camping today. The American Legion State Forest offers 30 sites in a wooded setting. The camping season begins in mid-April and ends Columbus Day.

Richard Anderson suggested that the Centennial Committee do a Legionnaire Cookbook. Would you buy one? Do you have any recipes?

The following was copied from the initiation of new members of Rau-Locke Post 8...written soon after the post was chartered in 1919-20. Information is at Dept. Headquarters, Rocky Hill, CT. The "Trees of Honor" in Colt's Park were erected in 1926.

Rau-Locke Post 8

"Comrade (s)

(Welcome)...From Hartford there are 209 heroes who made the supreme sacrifice in paying the price for our victory. They (have been) ...honored by the trees and plaques which have been placed as memorials... in Colt's Park by the city and ourselves; and from this group of heroes the names of two men in particular have been chosen.

The name Rau-Locke stands for **Major George J. Rau**, the commanding officer for the 1st Battalion, 102nd Infantry who was killed in action at Epieds, France, near chateau Thierry, July 25, 1918; and for **Captain Arthur F. Locke**, commanding officer of Company M, 102nd Infantry whose body was found after the battle of Seicheprey, April 20, 1918 and who, though pierced by several bullets, still held his gun in his hand when found.

George J. Rau enlisted in the 7th U.S. Cavalry March 2, 1900 and was discharged with the rank of corporal three years later, having served in the Cuban Campaign of pacification. He entered Company K, 1st Conn. Infantry May 26, 1903, was made a corporal Feb. 10, 1905 and sergeant May 26, 1906. In 1908 he became Battalion Sergeant-Major and on August 11, 1909 he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant of Battalion Staff. Assigned to Company H, 1st Conn., Infantry, Feb. 3, 1910 he was again promoted and on March 8, 1911, he became Captain. August 29, 1914 he was made a Major and served with that rank on the Mexican Border and in the World War until the time of his death.

Arthur F. Locke enlisted in Company F, 1st Conn. Infantry April 29, 1901 (and was promoted to) corporal July 31, 1905; sergeant May 20, 1907; 1st sergeant June 8, 1911; 2nd Lieutenant Nov. 27, 1911; and Captain after his return from the Mexican Border in Nov. 1916. I August 1917 he was assigned to command Company M, and retained that command until martyred for Democracy.

Both men were Hartford boys and became Hartford men, and were the heads of families. They were devoted to the service of their families as well as to the service of the state and nation. They were loved and respected by hundreds of civilians and by hundreds of soldiers with whom they fought and who they commanded. They were good citizens and brave soldiers; true exponents of the type which established and maintained our national integrity. We recommend to you that you pay proper respect to the memory of these men of the past, whose names will live forever, and that you do all that you can to teach the present and the coming generation to respect the memory and to emulate the example of these men whose names have been chosen by loving comrades to serve as a guide to this post."

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that no such selling campaign, solicitation or other commercial venture — including sponsorship of a circus, theatrical presentation, stage show or other similar fundraising endeavors, shall be conducted unless and until those proposing such undertakings shall first obtain the approval of a written request, which shall be filed with the Department Adjutant at least 30 days in advance of the undertaking. Such written request shall state all pertinent details of the proposed venture, including the names of all persons conducting or backing such venture, the subject matter, nature, type of solicitation involved, detailed arrangements agreed to by The American Legion Post, the territory in which such solicitation is to be conducted and all financial details of the proposed venture and;



The topic will be on some phase of the U.S. Constitution, selected from Articles and Sections as listed under assigned topics for the current year's contest in this brochure.

All contestants at each contest level are required to speak in the English language on the same assigned topic.

Amendment 8

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Amendment 26

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Article 1 Section 9 Paragraph 2

The privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

Article 1 Section 6 Clause 1

The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

POPPIES November 2015

In honor and in memory of all who served, all who are serving now and all who will serve in the future, this beautiful Poppy Story can be read again and again, especially on Veterans Day, November 11th.

"From the battlefields of World War I, weary soldiers brought home the memory of a barren landscape transformed by wild poppies, red as the blood that had soaked the soil. By that miracle of nature, the spirit of their lost comrades lived on.

The poppy became a symbol if the sacrifice of lives in war, represented the hope that none had died in vein. The American Legion Auxiliary Poppy has continued to bloom for the casualties of four wars, it's petals of paper bound together by veterans by veterans, reminding America each year that the men and women who have served and died for their country deserve to be remembered.

Poppy Day has become a familiar tradition in almost every American community. The distribution of the bright red memorial flower to the public is one of the odes and most widely recognized programs of the American Legion Auxiliary.

This poppy, as a memorial flower to the war dead, can be traced to a single individual, Miss Monia Michael. She was so moved by Col. McCrae's poem that she wrote a response:

...the blood of heroes never dies
But blends a luster to the red
Of the flower that blooms above the dead
To Flanders Fields.

On impulse she bought a bouquet of poppies – all that New York City's Wanamaker's Department Store had – and handed them to businessmen meeting in the New York YMCA where she worked. She asked them to wear a poppy as a tribute to the fallen. That was November 1918. World War I was over, but America's sons would rest forever in Flanders Field. Later, she would spearhead a campaign that would result in the adoption of the poppy as the national symbol of sacrifice."
