We visited our elected officials and attended National Commander Dale Barnett's testimony before a joint session of the House and Senate Committees on Veterans' Affairs. Available on our website www.ctlegion.org is a copy of the 114th Congress – 2nd Session Legislative Point Papers. Please take some time to review the American Legion's stance on the eleven items this legislative session. Use this information to speak with your respective Congressman and Senators for them to support America's veterans and pass legislation demanding accountability and improved performance from the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Increased Social Security Benefits For Vets

We have published this information before, but it seems like a good time to repeat it. Those with active duty between January 1957 and December 31, 2001 may obtain an extra Social Security Benefit. See the web site and notes below to possibly increase your Social Security Benefits. Please share this with anyone who had active duty service between January 1957 and December 31, 2001, and is planning for retirement. In a nutshell it boils down to this:

You qualify for a higher social security payment because of your Military service, for active duty any time from 1957 through 2001 (the program was done away with 1 January 2002). Up to \$1200 per year of earnings credit credited at time of application - which can make a substantial difference in social security monthly payments upon your retirement. You must bring your DD-214 to the Social Security Office and you must ask for this benefit to receive it!

This is something to put in your files for when you apply for Social Security down the road. It is NOT just for military retirees, BUT anyone who has served on active duty between January 1957 and December 31, 2001. FYI - this benefit is not automatic, you must ask for it!

Partisan Politics

You requested a review of the limitations on The American Legion becoming involved in partisan political activities. It may not.

This is made crystal clear by 36 US Code §21706 (part of The American Legion Corporate Charter), which states:

"The corporation shall be nonpolitical and may not promote the candidacy of an individual seeking public office."

This is further emphasized by the provisions of Article II, Section 2 of the National Constitution which provides:

> "The American Legion shall be absolutely nonpolitical and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor for the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking public office or preferment."

The American Legion takes positions on issues and lobbies for veteran's benefits and a strong America. This is clearly permitted. What is not permitted is the endorsement of any candidate or the donation of funds by The American Legion to a candidate. The American Legion takes positions on issues and its members being citizens need to be informed on the issues. Hence, American Legion programs such as candidate nights are fully authorized as long as all candidates are invited on the same terms and conditions. It would be illegal to invite the one you support with advance


notice, but the one you oppose with no notice at all. When Legionnaires wear their pins and hats to political rallies, the media often try to reach the wrong conclusions. This can be very embarrassing to the Legionnaire. Hence, we normally recommend that Legionnaires do not wear their caps to partisan political rallies. There is no rule against doing this so long as the Legionnaire makes it clear there is no endorsement.

Likewise, we recommend that Legion publications not accept paid political ads. However, if they do, the paid political advertisements must be made on the same terms and conditions for all candidates and should be labeled "Paid Political Advertisement" at both the top and bottom.

As noted above, those who violate the partisan political activities prohibition put the Legion charter of their post at risk as well as its tax exempt status.

The wearing of the cap and usage of The American Legion emblem, facilities and political donations

According to Article II, Section 2, of the Constitution of The American Legion, "The American Legion shall be absolutely nonpolitical and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor for the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking public office or preferment." The National Charter, approved by Congress, also stipulates The American Legion as an organization is nonpolitical* which has been interpreted by the National Judge Advocate as "nonpartisan" in modern lingo. Therefore, The American Legion as an organization is prohibited from contributing, helping or endorsing a candidate. However, a member, as a private citizen, and not representing the organization, can employ whatever legal and ethical means to advance his or her candidate.

The Legion cap is considered the official Legion uniform (see 2015 Post Officers Guide, p. 42). It is not an individual Legion member's decision on the appropriate usage of the cap and emblem. If attending a political event, The American Legion cap, or any clothing with the emblem visible, should be removed so as not to imply endorsement by The American Legion. The problem is the assumption of endorsement by those who see the emblem or name worn at an improper location, such as a partisan rally.

When using post facilities to host candidates, post should remove emblem and Legion flag to avoid any impression of endorsements. Candidates for all parties must be presented equal opportunity at the same time to use the facilities on the same terms and conditions as other competing candidates.

If financial contributions are offered by candidates for political office, campaigns, political action committees or political parties, The American Legion should politely decline. Accepting these contributions may be perfectly legal, but The American Legion must avoid any perception of supporting any candidate or political party.

The American Legion values its independence and effectiveness on veterans' issues. This stance is best maintained by neutrality on individual candidates or political parties. The American Legion by legal definition is non-partisan and supports only issues which impact your Four Pillars...

^{*} This means "non-partisan" in today's society. The American Legion is allowed by Congress to lobby for veterans benefits and a strong United States of America. (NJA, October 25, 2012)

2016 Connecticut American Legion Hall of Fame Inductees

Clarence C Scarborough, WWI, was a graduate of Yale University in 1906. He enlisted in the 1st Connecticut Infantry, Machine Gun Company on June 4, 1915. He served during World War I in France and retired in1922 as a Major. He first joined Rau-Locke Post 8 in Hartford, 1919, then transferred to Hayes-Velhage Post 96, West Hartford in 1920. He was elected Treasurer, Chairman of the S, S & M Fund & Liaison Officer on Sept 9, 1922. He served 1922-30. Then Liaison/Service Officer until January 6, 1961. He was the longest serving officer of the Connecticut American Legion with 39 years. Hugh Graham was second with 31 years. Clarence was an Honorary Past Department Commander. He died July 2, 1972.

George E. Ducanic, Korea, served in the US Navy, 1953-57. In 1980, George joined Oscar H. Cowan Post 3 with the urging of Bill Thomson with the idea of jump starting the baseball program and post. George became commander for the first time in 1983-84. When Ray Bernier left, George stepped in as the Service Officer and State Fund Rep. In 1987 and currently, he is the Post Commander, Finance Officer & Service Officer/State Fund Rep. He is a member of the State golf Committee. In 1993, the Stamford American Legion took over the local Marine Corps Toys for Tots Program under the leadership of George E Ducanic. And, in 2011, Stamford was recognized as The National Toys for Tots Campaign of the Year, an ongoing program of Post 3 & George Ducanic for the last 23 years.

Donald R Groman, Sr., Korea, served in the US Air Force, 1954-57. Joe Jackson recruited Donnie in 1987. In 1990, he was the Connecticut Recruiter of the Year, recruiting 86 new members. As Post 28 Commander, Donnie helped expand the scope of the town's Veteran's Memorial. Donnie created a Post Color Guard which took part in ceremonies and parades. Donnie Groman is one of 4 Legionnaires, who became Charter members of Steve Fahy's newly formed Department Color Guard in 1991, along with Pete Loux, Jerry Kennedy and Marty Hills. In the 6th District, Donnie served as Commander and Department Vice-Commander on three separate occasions: 1994-95, 2001-02 & 2002-03. At Department, he was a Department Executive Committeeman and past Chairman of Internal Affairs.

Ted C Graziani, Vietnam, is a retired state Legislator and Ellington, Selectman. He is married to Erin and they have 5 children. Ted Graziani served in the US Army from Aug 22, 1966 - June 6, 1968. Served in Vietnam during the Tet Offensive with the 539th & 610th Transportation Company. Ted joined Ellington Post 62 in 1989. He was the Post's Boys State chairman, Chaplain, 2 term post Senior Vice Commander and Commander. Ted's Legislative Accomplishments for veterans have been exceptionable. Two examples: he established Welcome Home Day for Vietnam Veterans...March 30, annually and enabled military spouse eligibility for unemployment compensation. Ted was our Chairman of VA & R: 2011-12, a member of our Legislative Committee and Soldiers', Sailors' and Marine Fund Commission. Ted is a past Americanism Award recipient and Legislator of the Year.

Martin David Hills, Vietnam War Veteran. He served in the US Army, 101st Airborne from the end of 1969 to 1971. Marty worked for the Old Saybrook Town Highway Crew for 41 years. Marty joined Faulk-Marcolini-Newman Post 113, Old Saybrook in 1987. In 1989, he was Senior Vice-Commander and the next year, he was the Post Commander. At the same time, he was elected 7th District Junior Vice-Commander. Marty served on the Department Color Guard from its start in 1991 to 2015. He held the following positions over the years: Jr Vice, 3 times as Sr Vice, at least 6 times as Commander and Finance Officer. Post Committees: membership, Children & Youth and SAL. In the 7th District, Marty served as commander in 1992-94 and 1998-99. Marty David Hills died September 11, 2015.

ALVIN L BUTTERS, JR., Vietnam, is a US Navy Veteran (enlisted & an Officer), serving from 1955 to 1975. Al retired as a Lieutenant Commander. He has been married to Nancy for 57 of years, they have 4 children. In 1976, Al joined Peter Gallan Post 104. He has been the Post Finance Officer for 36 years and on the Bingo committee for 38 years. He served as Post Commander 5 times. In the 5th District, he was elected District Commander, 1983-84. Al Butters first was appointed to the Dept. Children and Youth Committee in 1991, participating in the first 3 Family Walkathons, and then appointed to the Boys' State Commission. An appointment that he has never relinquished! As the Post Boys' & Girls' State chairman, he now sends 8 Boys & 8 girls, annually. Al is an Honorary Life Member.

Fred McCarthy, Vietnam, served in the U.S. Army in the 23rd Infantry Regiment at Fort Benning, GA during Vietnam. He has been married to Kay for 38 years, they have 4 children. Russ Smith signed him up to Hamden Post 88 and as a team they helped revitalize posts: 1, 184 & 192. Fred became Commander, a position he has held many times since 2006. In the 2nd District, he was the District Judge Advocate, Junior Vice-Commander and on the Department Personnel Committee and Soldiers, Sailors and Marine Fund Commission. Fred McCarthy has been a tireless advocate for veterans in Hamden. He helped over 100 veterans get enrolled in the VA system. Fred volunteers at the VA hospital, the VA's Errera Center, the American Legion Auxiliary Gift Shop, and helps at the Brooksvale Park garden to provide produce for the community and St. Anne's Soup Kitchen. He joined as he noted "To Be Part of Something Good!" Just 15 years, ago!

Roger Herbert Anderson, Vietnam, is a US AIR FORCE Veteran, serving from 1963 - 1973, as a Russian linguist. Roger has been married to Donna for 40 years, they have 3 children. Roger joined the Legion and Post 200 in 1989 after receiving assistance from the S, S & M Fund. Roger transferred to Abe E. Miller Post 133, South Windsor in 2000, when the post completed reorganization. Since those early days, Roger has been primarily the Post Adjutant, except when he was Commander 2002-2003. Roger H Anderson is a Boys State Counselor, a commission member and a member of the Boys & Girls State Foundation. He is the Post & District Oratorical Chairman and was the Department Oratorical Program Co-Director. He volunteers for the Auxiliary's Christmas Shop, the Foolish Follies & Legions Kids Walk. He has been the 1st District Junior Vice, Judge Advocate and Department Executive Committeeman. At Department, he has been the Dept. Historian, Sergeant-At-Arms, and assistant Sgt-At-Arms. He has been the co-chair of the Department Legislative Committee. He is the Post, District & Department Representative at the Newington VA. IRS Exempt Organization Updates: 990-N (e-Postcard)

The IRS has posted that the host site for the annual filings of the 990-N (e-Postcard) will be changing on **February 29, 2016**.

How does this affect Connecticut American Legion Posts? The overall impact should be minor for those organizations filing for the tax years of 2014 or 2015.

The transition requires the following:

Those Posts of the American Legion that <u>have already filed</u> the 990-N online for the current required tax year prior to February 29, 2016 <u>will not be impacted until the next required filing due date</u>. However, when your organization is required to file, please note that the site has changed and it will be necessary to establish a new account on the new IRS repository system for filing.

The IRS will formerly take over the 990-N (e-Postcard) system of filing February 29, 2016. The IRS will not be obtaining or retrieving the already established account data of user id(s) and passwords from the Urban Institute.

Connecticut American Legion Posts that <u>have NOT filed</u> a 990-N for the current tax year <u>before</u> <u>February 29, 2016</u> should note that the host site has changed and the account-user ids and passwords, established through the host site of Urban Institute will no longer work with the new IRS repository system for filing. The IRS requires that the eligible organizations required to file the 990-N (e-Postcard) <u>will need to establish a new account – user id and password</u> on or after February 29, 2016.

Annual Electronic Filing Requirement for Small Exempt Organizations — Form 990-N (e-Postcard)

Most small tax-exempt organizations whose annual gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less are required to electronically submit Form 990-N, *Electronic Notice (e-Postcard) for Tax-Exempt Organizations Not Required to File Form 990 or Form 990EZ*.

- Form 990-N must be completed and filed electronically. There is no paper form.
- Form 990-N filers may choose to file a complete Form 990 or Form 990-EZ instead.

Form 990-N filing due date: Form 990-N is due every year by the 15th day of the 5th month after the close of your tax year. You cannot file the e-Postcard until after your tax year ends.

Example: If your tax year ended on December 31, the *e-Postcard* is due **May 15** of the following year. If the due date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, the due date is the next business day. This is the case for most Posts in Connecticut.

If your 990-N is late, the IRS will send a reminder notice to the last address of record.

While there is no penalty assessment for filing Form 990-N late, organizations that fail to file required Forms 990, 990-EZ or 990-N for three consecutive years will <u>automatically lose their tax-exempt status</u>. Revocation of the organization's tax-exempt status will happen on the filing due date of the third consecutively-missed year. Watch this IRS YouTube presentation for more information.

How to file

To file 990-N on or before February 28, 2016:

The Urban Institute will continue to host Form 990-N at http://epostcard.form990.org/ until February 28, 2016. If you file your organization's tax-year 2015 990-N on or **before** February 28, 2016, you won't be required to register for the new Form 990 submission process at IRS.gov until you file your tax-year 2016 Form 990-N in 2017.

To file 990-N on or after February 29, 2016:

The IRS will begin hosting Form 990-N on February 29, 2016. All form 990-N users (including users previously registered with Urban Institute) who file after February 28, 2016, will be required to register before completing the 990-N.

This is a one-time registration. You won't need to register each year.

In the unlikely event that technical issues delay implementation of the new Form 990-N submission process, systems are in place to prevent organizations from being penalized if their filing due dates occur before the system is in place. To avoid this, please consider filing your 2015 return prior to February 29. (This information is too late for this option!)

Information you will need Form 990-N is easy to complete. You'll need only <u>eight items of basic information</u> about your organization.

Who must file Most small tax-exempt organizations with gross receipts that are normally \$50,000 or less must file the *e-Postcard* (see <u>Who Must File FAQs</u>). Exceptions to this requirement include:

- Organizations that are included in a group return,
- · Churches, their integrated auxiliaries, and conventions or associations of churches, and
- Organizations required to file a different return

Fully fund a superior national defense and protect troops from sequester cuts: The global threat to America is great, whether from the Islamic State, North Korea or many other corners of the earth. The American Legion believes national security is upheld by keeping a well-funded Department of Defense, a good quality of life for troops and a sensible separation transition from military service to civilian life. This includes keeping all of our promises to those who enlist to serve, and fighting against those who would sacrifice the benefits of those who serve for short term budget gains. Although the severity of the sequester cuts has been lessened, force reductions continue, and the military remains in a recovery mode after absorbing the dramatic cuts of the previous fiscal year.

Oppose Diminution of Military Benefits: The American Legion stands strong against those who would further dilute the promises made in the contract with those who served and still serve in our nation's defense. We strongly oppose any proposed degradations of the promised health care and benefits to retired service members from when they enlisted.

Ensure Real Accountability within VA: The American Legion believes in a strong Department of Veterans Affairs; to restore trust and confidence in VA there must real accountability employees and management who breach the compact and violate the trust of veterans. There must be consequences for performance and actions that hurt veterans and veterans deserve to see justice is swift and serious when those in the VA act against veterans' interests.

Building a 21st Century Healthcare System for Veterans: Veterans need to know there will be a robust system built for them and to care for their needs. The American Legion led the way in calling for reform in the midst of a crisis in patient access to VA health care. Access problems can be solved with a consolidated plan for community care, but The American Legion strongly opposes efforts to privatize care and diminish the VA healthcare system.

Provide Help for Veterans Struggling with Mental Health and Brain Injury: The American Legion has dedicated extensive resources to studying devastating effects of Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI). Service members and veterans suffering through these conditions deserve access to the best care and research, and advances in Complementary and Alternative Medicine (CAM).

Ensure Transition Programs are Not Adversely Affected Sequestration: The devastating cuts to the Defense budgets wrought by sequestration are having unforeseen effects on the ability to help service members transitioning to the civilian world. Transition Assistance Programs (TAP) face budget shortfalls as every defense dollar has to be squeezed to meet readiness goals, all while huge cuts to force strength are putting more service members out on the streets. Congress must act to reverse these cuts and ensure veterans aren't put at a disadvantage as they are forced from the service.

End Veteran Homelessness:

BLUMENTHAL DEMANDS REFORMS TO EXPEDITE VA APPEALS HEARINGS

VA Heeds Blumenthal Call and Adds Additional Hearing Date, but More Needed in Connecticut and Nationwide To Ensure Timely Review of Veteran Appeals

(Hartford, CT) – U.S. Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.) today joined Connecticut veterans in demanding reforms to expedite Board of Veterans Appeals hearings following a decision that would have left all Connecticut veterans waiting until FY2017 or later for appeals hearings.

Veterans Benefits Administration has 440,000 appeals pending nationwide, with some veterans waiting years for resolution. In one outrageous case, a veteran wanted 25 years for a final decision.

Earlier this year, BVA informed veterans that there would be no hearings through the remainder of fiscal year 2016 for the Hartford Veterans Administration Regional Office. Instead, BVA intended to divert resources to other areas of the country facing even longer wait times. That decision meant that Connecticut veterans who filed appeals in 2014 would have had to wait until at least FY2017 for a decision, and veterans who filed appeals this year could have expected to wait another two years for a decision. After hearing from numerous veterans and advocates outraged by the move, Blumenthal wrote Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert McDonald to urge that BVA reverse its decision and provide additional hearing dates for Connecticut veterans.

Heeding Blumenthal's call, BVA has now agreed to add a new videoconference hearing date for Connecticut veterans—a stop gap measure that will provide relief to a limited number of veterans. Blumenthal and veterans today called on BVA to commit to a plan for additional hearings to ensure timely access to justice for Connecticut veterans. Blumenthal also called for broader reforms to appeals hearings to eliminate the backlog in Connecticut and nationwide.

"Justice delayed is justice denied, and no veteran in Connecticut or nationwide should be forced to wait years for the benefits they earned and deserve. The majority of these cases involve disability benefits— in many cases a lifeline for injured and disabled veterans unable to work. VA must establish new procedures immediately to address the oldest appeals without prejudicing and unduly prolonging newer ones," Blumenthal said.

Full text of the letter to Secretary McDonald is below:

Dear Secretary McDonald:

I write to urge your immediate review of the recent changes to the Board of Veterans Appeals (BVA) scheduling priorities allocating hearing dates to the oldest pending cases nationwide, and thereby systematically shortchanging others.

Apparently, BVA is seeking to clear the oldest cases—some delayed by many years—which is a commendable goal. While I share your desire to address the oldest pending cases, the end result is there are currently no BVA hearings allocated to the Hartford Veterans Administration Regional Office (VARO) for the remainder of fiscal year 2016. This outcome, even if unintended, is simply unacceptable. If no additional hearing dates are provided to process newer cases in Connecticut, BVA will be contributing to another backlog and making our veteran appeals wait unacceptably long for a fair, adequate result.

Already, veteran constituents and their representatives have contacted me expressing frustration that they will not receive a hearing in ten months and also that the number of cases pending ahead of them will not be reduced. In essence, the pending line of appeals will be frozen for at least 10 months while more appeals will undoubtedly be added. Further, veterans who filed appeals in 2014 will receive no hearing until after 2016 and veterans who filed their appeals in 2015 with likely not receive a hearing for another 2 years. While veterans may elect to proceed with an in-person hearing in Washington, D.C., many lack the financial means to do so. BVA provides no monetary assistance for them to do so. As a result, I believe the best solution would be to allocate adequate resources and docket dates for Hartford VARO hearings.


I appreciate BVA's cooperation in addressing my concerns regarding the Hartford VARO, and I hope this cooperation with result in additional hearings for Connecticut veterans. Even with such short term steps, BVA must establish a new procedure to address the oldest appeals without prejudicing and unduly prolonging newer ones. Such exacerbated, egregious delay denies justice to veterans in Connecticut. I urge you to reconsider and revise the recent changes in the hearings process to allocate adequate resources and BVA hearings to the Hartford VARO and other similarly situated VARO's. Please inform my office, as well as veterans and veteran representatives, of any changes in process for requesting additional hearings.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. I look forward to your response.

HR 3016 Passes

At the time of this writing, The House of Representatives voted on and passed House Resolution (HR) 3016 in February. The bill moves on to the Senate for its approval, and from there to the President for signature. This bill makes several significant changes to education benefits for Service members and their dependents. Below is a summary of the proposed changes in this bill:

1. Additional Post-9/11 GI Bill Qualifying Time for Reservists.

Reservists on orders for medical treatment under Title 10 Section 12301(h), will be able to count that time as qualifying service and may receive increased Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits.

2. MHA Cut For Dependents Using Post-9/11.

Reduces a child's Monthly Housing Allowance (MHA) by 50%; a spouse's MHA does not change.

3. Renewed Work Study Program.

A great job opportunity for Veteran students, will be renewed until 2020.

4. Expansion of Yellow Ribbon.

Spouses and children using the Fry Scholarship will be eligible for the Yellow Ribbon program, which helps defray the cost of tuition at private or foreign schools.

5. In-State Tuition Rates.

All Soldiers, Veterans and dependents using Post-9/11 GI Bill will be charged the in-state tuition rate, regardless of where they live or attend school.

6. Flight Training Cap.

Flight training, which previously had no limit, will have the same annual cap as training at a private or foreign school.

IMPORTANT!

Service members who transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits BEFORE this bill becomes law will retain the <u>full MHA for their children</u> while those who wait risk receiving reduced benefits.


